FIVE NEW Mk III Wheelyboats have been launched this spring at venues in England, Wales and Ireland. The new boats are located at Siblyback Lake (Liskeard), Clatworthy Reservoir (Taunton), Sutton Bingham Reservoir (Yeovil), Staylitttle Outdoor Centre (Llyn Clywedog) and the River Blackwater (Fermoy). These boats provide disabled people with access to a wide variety of activities including nature watching, pleasure boating and angling. The Mk III, developed by the Trust last year, is its most versatile Wheelyboat to date.

More than a hundred guests joined the Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall, Lady Mary Holborow, for the launch of Siblyback's new Wheelyboat.

The boat's principal users will be from the Echo Centre in Liskeard, a day centre for disabled people, which raised the majority of funds to purchase the boat. They will use it for activity days on the lake with their accessible sailing dinghy.

Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall charmed guests at the launch of the Sutton Bingham Wheelyboat with a story of how his father helped him catch a mackerel in Richmond Park when he was six! He has been hooked ever since.

Fermoy's Mk III was purchased after some spectacular fundraising events, most notably a 255ft bungee jump over the river by Glenda Powell.

New Wheelyboat model will revolutionise disabled angling

THIS YEAR will see the design and launch of a stillwater version of the Tweed Wheelyboat which was developed by the Trust last year. The stillwater version will be an important addition to the Wheelyboat fleet and will help the Trust in its aims of creating a portfolio of different craft that meet the needs of a broad range of users and activities, rather than making do with a one-size-fits-all solution. The stillwater model will be a dedicated angling boat for use on larger waters such as reservoirs and lochs.

While standard Wheelyboats have proved invaluable at providing access to disabled anglers for the past 22 years, their design has always been a compromise between performance and accessibility, with accessibility being the major component. The stillwater model will retain 100% of the performance of a purpose-built angling boat while enabling disabled anglers to board easily and safely from a pontoon. The boat's deck will be level throughout and the angler can sit at the bow or stern and take the helm if he wishes. It will easily accommodate two wheelchair users. The boat will be based on Jim Coulam's 16' reservoir boat which has a broad and stable 6' beam. Extra ballast will be added to the keel to increase stability even further. The boat will provide a safe and stable platform for disabled anglers; it will be easy to use and, very importantly, it will look and perform like all the other boats in the fleet. Standard Wheelyboats differ in size and shape to the rest of a fishery's fleet and, as a result, some disabled anglers feel conspicuous when using them. Not only will the stillwater model be identical to other boats, it can be used by anyone, disabled or not, thus appealing to fisheries as a genuinely dual-purpose craft. The new boat should be in production by the autumn.
